SCRIPTURE READINGS Exodus 1:15-2:10

The king of Egypt said to the Hebrew midwives, one of whom was named Shiphrah and the other Puah, 'When you act as midwives to the Hebrew women, and see them on the birthstool, if it is a boy, kill him; but if it is a girl, she shall live.' But the midwives feared God; they did not do as the king of Egypt commanded them, but they let the boys live. So the king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, 'Why have you done this, and allowed the boys to live?' The midwives said to Pharaoh, 'Because the Hebrew women are not like the Egyptian women; for they are vigorous and give birth before the midwife comes to them.' So God dealt well with the midwives; and the people multiplied and became very strong. And because the midwives feared God, he gave them families. Then Pharaoh commanded all his people, 'Every boy that is born to the Hebrews you shall throw into the Nile, but you shall let every girl live.'

Now a man from the house of Levi went and married a Levite woman. The woman conceived and bore a son; and when she saw that he was a fine baby, she hid him for three months. When she could hide him no longer she got a papyrus basket for him, and plastered it with bitumen and pitch; she put the child in it and placed it among the reeds on the bank of the river. His sister stood at a distance, to see what would happen to him.

The daughter of Pharaoh came down to bathe at the river, while her attendants walked beside the river. She saw the basket among the reeds and sent her maid to bring it. When she opened it, she saw the child. He was crying, and she took pity on him. 'This must be one of the Hebrews' children,' she said. Then his sister said to Pharaoh's daughter, 'Shall I go and get you a nurse from the Hebrew women to nurse the child for you?' Pharaoh's daughter said to her, 'Yes.' So the girl went and called the child's mother. Pharaoh's daughter said to her, 'Take this child and nurse it for me, and I will give you your wages.' So the woman took the child and nursed it. When the child grew up, she brought him to Pharaoh's daughter, and she took him as her son. She named him Moses, 'because,' she said, 'I drew him out of the water.'

Exodus 15:20-21

Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them:

‘Sing to the LORD, for he has triumphed gloriously;
horse and rider he has thrown into the sea.’

Numbers 12

While they were at Hazeroth, Miriam and Aaron spoke against Moses because of the Cushite woman whom he had married (for he had indeed married a Cushite woman); and they said, ‘Has the LORD spoken only through Moses? Has he not spoken through us also?’ And the LORD heard it. Now the man Moses was very humble, more so than anyone else on the face of the earth. Suddenly the LORD said to Moses, Aaron, and Miriam, ‘Come out, you three, to the tent of meeting.’ So the three of them came out. Then the LORD came down in a pillar of cloud, and stood at the entrance of the tent, and called Aaron and Miriam; and they both came forward. And he said, ‘Hear my words:

When there are prophets among you, I the LORD make myself known to them in visions; I speak to them in dreams. Not so with my servant Moses; he is entrusted with all my house. With him I speak face to face—clearly, not in riddles; and he beholds the form of the LORD.

Why then were you not afraid to speak against my servant Moses?’ And the anger of the LORD was kindled against them, and he departed.

When the cloud went away from over the tent, Miriam had become leprous, as white as snow. And Aaron turned towards Miriam and saw that she was leprous. Then Aaron said to Moses, ‘Oh, my lord, do not punish us for a sin that we have so foolishly committed. Do not let her be like one stillborn, whose flesh is half consumed when it comes out of its mother's womb.’ And Moses cried to the LORD, ‘O God, please heal her.’ But the LORD said to Moses, ‘If her father had but spat in her face, would she not bear her shame for seven days? Let her be shut out of the camp for seven days, and after that she may be brought in again.’ So Miriam was shut out of the camp for seven days; and the people did not set out on the march until Miriam had been brought in again. After that, the people set out from Hazeroth, and camped in the wilderness of Paran.

SERMON

Resisting Evil

We remember the story of Moses leading the Israelites to the Promised Land, but we might not know of all the women who made it possible. Today we'll talk about them.

Puah and Shiprah were two Hebrew midwives.

When a woman gave birth, they went to help. Pharaoh had noticed how many more

children were being born and was concerned that the Hebrew people would soon outnumber the Egyptians. So he decided the best thing to do was to have the midwives kill all the male babies at birth. Puah and Shiprah believed in God and that killing these babies was wrong, so instead of killing the male babies, they delivered them and told Pharaoh that the Hebrew women were so strong that they gave birth before the midwives got there. And so many babies were saved. Midwives were typically women who were unable to have babies, so they were at the bottom of the social ladder, but because they acted so bravely, God blessed them with children and families. But Pharaoh saw the Hebrew people growing more numerous and commanded his people to throw all the male Hebrew children into the river to kill them.

Moses was one of the babies the midwives had saved. His mother hid him away until he began to make noise. She knew it wouldn't be long until he was found, so she made a basket, waterproofed it, and placed the baby Moses in it. She set it out in the river and left Moses' sister, Miriam, to watch and see what happened.

Pharaoh's daughter came to bathe in the river. As she bathed, her attendants were walking beside the river. She saw the basket in the water and set one of her maids to get it. She saw that it was a Hebrew baby and took pity on him. She knew her father would want him killed. Miriam saw her find the baby and asked her if she should find a nurse for him. So Pharaoh's daughter worked with Miriam to make sure Moses survived. So Miriam brought her mother to be his nurse and Pharaoh's daughter paid her to take care of her own son.

When Moses grew up, his mother brought him to the Pharaoh's daughter. She named him "Moses" because she had drawn him out of the water.

Thanks to Puah, Shiprah, Moses' mother, and his sister Miriam, Moses lived to be an especially important man: the one who led his people out of lives of slavery in Egypt

Our second scripture is Miriam's song of victory after the Israelites crossed the Red Sea and the Pharaoh's armies perished in the water as it closed back up. Miriam has been known as a prophet by the Israelites.

The next time we see Miriam in the scriptures is in the book of Numbers.

Moses has married a Cushite woman. Miriam and Aaron, Moses' brother, do not like this Ethiopian woman who has very dark skin. They don't say anything to Moses about his wife, but they work together to undermine Moses' authority.

God heard this and called them together to let them know they were wrong to do this.

God tells them that he speaks to prophets through dreams, but he has spoken to Moses in person, without dreams and images because God has trusted Moses with everything. And, according to the story, God punishes Miriam with leprosy, presumably God chose this punishment because their judgment against Moses' wife is because of her skin. We do not know why Aaron does not get leprosy, but we do know that Miriam's leprosy didn't last long.

Our lesson today is very much about resisting evil and making a way where there seems to be no way. Puah and Shiprah resist the evil plan of Pharaoh and are rewarded with families of their own. Moses' mother and sister Miriam, find a way to save his life a second time, when survival seems most unlikely. Even Pharaoh's daughter gets into the act and makes it possible for the Israelites to survive genocide and escape slavery, knowing full well her father's plan.

How differently might the history of the Jewish tradition have gone without these women?

How might our own faith history have changed?

How can we in our time, resist the powers of evil in our midst, fulfilling our vows at baptism? How do we resist the evils of our own time?

I pray that we not only recognize the evil plans of others, but resist them, so that God's plan for us to love one another, fight for justice for all people, and live in peace together can become a reality. Amen.

PASTORAL PRAYER

And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the kingdom, and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.
